**Guildford Spectrum, Parkway, Guildford GU1 1UP**

**Signposted from A3, follow signs to Leisure Centre. When entering the Leisure Centre the football ground is at the end of the drive, with a large amount of free parking.**

**From the A3 (North) – Exit at the Leisure Centre, turn left at the traffic lights after the exit, then immediately left into the Parkway, past the Premier Inn hotel. The Leisure Centre (Spectrum) is on the brow of a hill on the left at the next traffic lights.**

# Our History

The club was established in 1895 after a discussion at St Michael's church, and was originally named St Michael's Foot-ball Club, although they became known as St Michael's, Camberley.

The first match, a friendly, was played on 16 October against D Company from the Royal Military College in nearby Sandhurst, St Michael's won 4–2. In January 1896 they joined the Surrey County Football Association, entering and winning the Surrey Junior Cup in 1897–98; the club's first competitive game was played on 16 October 1897, a Junior Cup first round match against Farncombe which St Michael's won 5–2. After winning the cup, the club joined the East & West Surrey League for the 1898–99 season.

In January 1901 a public meeting was held, at which it was decided to establish a new club that would absorb both St Michael's and Camberley Magpies. The name Camberley & Yorktown was adopted and the club took St Michael's place in the East & West Surrey League. However, they dropped into the Aldershot Combination in 1902, before switching to the Ascot & District League in 1903. The club finished as runners-up in their first season and went on to win the league in 1904–05. They were runners-up again in 1905–06, before winning a hat-trick of successive titles in 1907–08, 1908–09 and 1909–10, remaining unbeaten throughout the third of the title-winning seasons. The season also saw them win the Surrey Junior Cup for a second time, beating Sutton United 2–0 in the final. In 1910 Camberley & Yorktown returned to the East & West Surrey League, which had been renamed the West

Surrey League. In 1912–13 the club also entered the three-club Aldershot Senior Civilian League, which they won. They went on to win the West Surrey League the following season.

In 1922 Camberley & Yorktown were founder members of the Surrey Senior League. They won three successive titles in 1930–31, 1931–32 and 1932–33 and were runners-up in 1938–39. After World War II the club was renamed Camberley, and were Surrey Senior League runners-up in 1946–47, before winning the league's Charity Cup in 1951–52 with a 4–3 win over Chertsey Town. The club were league runners-up again in 1961–62, and adopted their current name on 2 June 1967 after merging with former Parthenon League club

Camberley Wanderers. In 1973 they joined the Spartan League, but left to join Division Two of the Athenian League in 1975. In 1977 they switched to Division Two of the Isthmian League, and were promoted to Division One after finishing as Division Two runners-up in 1978–79. Two seasons later they were relegated, and after a single season back in Division Two, they rejoined the Athenian League, which now had a single division.

In 1983 Rick Wakeman became the club's chairman while he was living in Camberley. He remained in this post until 1986 when he was elected Vice-President, and left the club when he moved to the Isle of Man in 1988. In 1984 the Athenian League disbanded; Camberley rejoined the Isthmian League and were placed in Division Two South, where they remained until being placed in Division Three following league reorganisation in 1991. In 1998–99 the club reached the first round of the FA Cup for the first time. Drawn against away to Third Division Brentford, they lost 5–0. Division Three became Division Two in 2002, and Camberley remained members until the end of the 2005–06 season, when they dropped into the Premier Division of the Combined Counties League through the FA's re-structuring of non-league football. They were runners-up in the division in 2013–14 and 2014–15.



They came third in the 2015-16 season in the North division of the Combined counties league 2016-17 saw a sixth place finish and seventh the season after. 2018-19 saw a sixteenth place finish and with the 2019-20 season not finishing and the 2020-21 one not even starting due to covid, they started the 2021-22 season in the Combined Counties Premier Division South and Manager Luke Turkington oversaw a twelfth place finish on 44 points. 2022-23 Season was an improvement on the previous finishing tenth with 52 Points, with a fantastic run of 1 defeat in the last 14 league games of the season, that was at a time when games were coming thick and fast as the season had to be extended by 2 weeks to make up for the bad weather earlier in the campaign. 2023-24 was a disappointing season which was entered into with the hope to push on from the prior years and maybe see if we could get in the top 5 for the newly instigated playoffs.

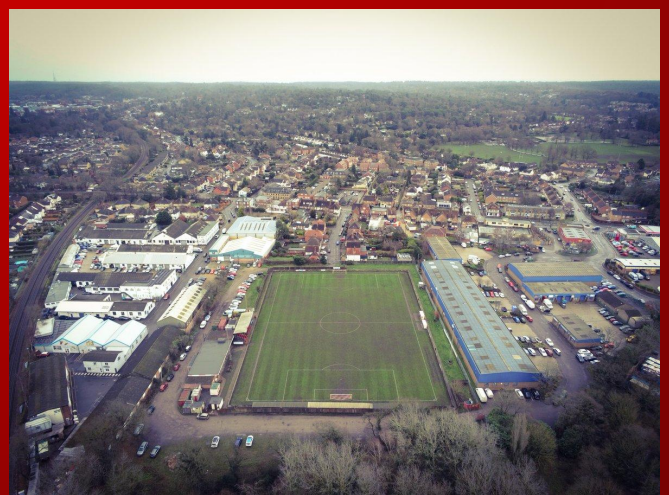
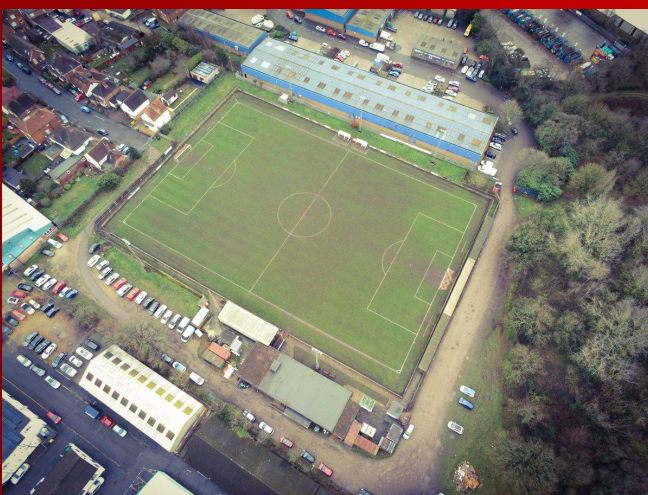
## GROUND

In 1898 the club started playing at the new Recreation Ground on London Road, although they also used a pitch near Southwell Park Road when the Recreation Ground was unavailable and had moved there permanently by 1905. They played there until moving to Martin's Meadow in 1909. However, when the tenancy came to an end, the club returned to the Recreation Ground.

Since 1923 the club have played at Krooner Park on Wilton Road. The ground was paid for with the winnings of a horse named Krooner who won two races at Haydock Park Racecourse in 1920.

It was officially opened on 22 December 1923. Due to financial difficulties Krooner Park was sold back to the local council in 1939 with the council guaranteeing that the ground would be retained in perpetuity and that it would be rented to the football club, giving them priority whilst they remained in existence. In the mid-1960s the club asked the council to leave Krooner Park and build a new ground at South-cote Park Farm, but the request was rejected due to the amount of engineering that would be required.

Floodlights were installed at the ground in 1974, with the first floodlit match being a friendly against Crystal Palace on 14 October. The attendance at the match, which ended in a 1–1 draw, was around 3,100, a ground record. The highest confirmed attendance at Krooner Park was 2,066 when the newly-formed Aldershot Town visited for an Isthmian League Division Three match on 10 November 1992.

## Hassocks FC

Formed : 1902

Home Ground : The Beacon

Current Season : 9th

Southern Combination Football League



Hassocks Football Club was founded in 1902 and spent the first 80 years of its existence competing in the Mid Sussex Football League and Brighton and Hove and District Football League, playing at Adastra Park in the middle of the village. The Robins first piece of silverware came when lifting the Mid Sussex League's prestigious Mowatt Cup in 1928.

In 1960, they added the showpiece trophy of the Montgomery Cup to their honours list. It was a move to the Brighton & Hove League in the mid 1960s that really started to get Hassocks noticed. The Robins won promotion from Division Three to Division One in back-to-back seasons in 1965 and 1966, eventually lifting the Brighton League title in 1972 after finishing runners up the previous year. The Sussex Intermediate Cup was added in 1975 to complete a golden era for Hassocks. Ambitions of senior football were finally realised for 1981-82 when the club became members of Division One of the Southern Combination Football League. They finished that first season in 12th place and consolidated their hard earned senior status with a succession of top half placings in the division, until a change in ground grading rules saw them demoted into Division Two and a return to intermediate football. After several seasons of treading water, 1991 saw huge changes. Former player and manager Jim Goodrum took over as chairman, Dave John arrived as general manager from Haywards Heath Town and a new coaching team of Nick Greenwood and Peter Liddell took over first team affairs with a massive influx of players. Results were immediate. Greenwood and Liddell led Hassocks to the 1991-92 Division Two title by 10 points in their first season at the helm. More importantly, the progress on the pitch was matched off it with the club finally leaving Adastra Park to move into its own purpose built ground at The Beacon. The improved facilities which members had spent many years working to secure and build enabled promotion to Division One and a return to senior football. Just three years later and Greenwood and Liddell took Hassocks into the Premier Division of the Southern Combination League for the first time as runners up in Division One. Having remained in the Premier Division ever since, the Robins are currently the division's longest serving club.

Floodlights now had to be provided at the Beacon. They came through fundraising and a generous donation from Chelsea vice-chairman and friend of the Robins, Matthew Harding.

Mr Harding lived locally and his sons Pat and Joel would go onto represent the club. The floodlights were officially opened when a Chelsea XI featuring Graham Rix and Liam Brady made the journey to the Beacon. The 1995-96 season saw Hassocks make their debut in the FA Vase. A year later and the Robins entered the FA Cup. Their best run in the world's greatest cup competition came under the management of John, who led Hassocks all the way to the third qualifying round in 2001-02. Their adventure was finally ended by Lewes, who themselves enjoyed a memorable year in the FA Cup by advancing to the first round proper and a meeting with Stoke City.

2002 saw Hassocks mark their centenary by facing an ex-Arsenal and Celebrity XI. Later in the year and Steve Coppell took charge of Brighton and Hove Albion for the first time when the Seagulls visited the Beacon to open the new 237-seater Maurice Boxall Stand, funded in part by the previous season's FA Cup run.

In 2007, the ground was improved further with the opening of a new clubhouse after a long fundraising and building process. The Beacon has regularly held Southern Combination League cup finals ever since, highlighting the excellent facilities at the ground.

The 2011-12 season saw Mickey Jewell lead Hassocks to their highest ever finish of fourth in the Premier Division. A memorable campaign also saw the Robins reach the semi final of the RUR Cup. Jewell stepped down at the end of the 2013-14 season, replaced by club legend John returning for a brief third spell at the helm alongside his duties as chairman. John was followed by Mark Dalgleish and Phil Wickwar, who produced a great escape from relegation in the second half of the 2014-15 season. Dalgleish and Wickwar continued to do well under difficult circumstances, defying the odds to avoid the drop despite being one of the only sides in the Premier Division not to pay their players. The Robins' proud run of never finishing in the bottom three of the top flight came to an end at the conclusion of the 2017-18 season, although they were spared relegation as only two sides went down. Wickwar stood down at the end of the campaign, leaving Dalgleish in sole charge for 2018-19.

Hassocks were in the Premier Division's bottom two when Covid-19 brought the 2019-20 season to a premature end, leading to Dalgleish's departure after a decade at the Beacon. John was back in charge for the 2020-21 season which again was curtailed due to the pandemic. John moved upstairs to become technical director ahead of the 2021-22 campaign, with Brad Sweetman stepping up to become first team head coach from his role as Under 18s manager. Sweetman had been part of John's management team that led the Under 18s to an historic treble in 2017-18, following that up with a succession of runners up finishes when left in sole charge of the Young Robins. Now, he and the players he had brought through the youth system and into the first team over the past five seasons had the opportunity to prove themselves at senior level. A difficult first half of the season in which relegation looked a distinct possibility gave way to a much improved second half. Hassocks ended the campaign in 16th spot and reached the semi finals of the RUR Cup for the first time in a decade. Sweetman was replaced at the end of the season by fan favourite player James Westlake. His rebuilt squad made up of new faces and former players lured back to the Beacon finished 10th in 2022-23, securing the club's first top half placing in nine years.

Better was to come in 2023-24. Hassocks acquired a club-record 78 points to finish fifth in the table under Westlake, qualifying for the promotion playoffs for the first time. The Robins were eliminated by eventual winners Eastbourne Town. John retired as chairman at the end of the season, ending over 33 years of day-to-day involvement in running the Robins. The club appointed John president in honour of his service and the Clubhouse bar at the Beacon was renamed the Dave John Lounge. His final gift was the appointment of his successor. The second-highest goal scorer in Hassocks history, Pat Harding, stepped straight from retirement as a player into the role of chairman, bringing ambitious new ideas to continue the Robins' progress on and off the pitch.

# Defends like Beckenbauer, Passes like Zico

On 11th December 2004, Argentina mourned the first death of one of their World Cup winners. Jose Luis Cuciuffo was just 43 years old, and had been hunting in the southern tip of the country. 100km from the nearest hospital, he hit a mound in the road, and the rifle that he had between his legs discharged, firing through his liver, and then ricocheting into his neck. He died en route to the hospital, the blood loss overwhelming. He would be remembered as an Argentine legend, and beloved by Maradona. That itself is high praise in the South American nation.

Born in Cordoba in 1961, Cuchu put plans for an engineering degree on permanent hold when he was recruited by local club Huracan in 1978. He impressed enough in his first two years as a professional to earn a move to one of Cordoba's giants, Talleres, where he slotted immediately into the team. An underwhelming season from the club couldn't disguise the youngster's undoubted ability, and he made 43 appearances in his first year, securing a reputation as an exceptional centre back.

He moved on to Velez Sarsfield in 1982 - a modest team in the early 1980s - despite being chased by a number of other clubs. Over the next three years, he helped bring them into title contention, and in 1985 they finished runners up. Marshalling their defence, with his ability to read the game and play a pass, he wouldn't be out of place in today's game. That skillset was spotted by national team manager Carlos Bilardo, and in 1986 he was selected by the Albiceleste for the 1986 World Cup.

Cuchu was left out of the team for the first game against South Korea, but was drafted in for the second against Italy. His task was to mark Giuseppe Galderisi out of the game, the Italian already signed up to move to Milan after the tournament. He wasn't a prolific forward, but he was quick and tricky and it was a difficult introduction to the tournament. The game finished 1-1, and Cuchu was important in keeping the Italians at bay.

However, it was in the third game against Bulgaria that Cuchu really began to shine. Playing out of position at right back, it didn't take him long to find his feet. With just four minutes on the clock, he stole the ball off of the winger. Getting out from under his feet, he played a long, deep cross into the box. Maradona would describe the cross as 'Garrincha style'. It looped into the box, where Jorge Valdano was waiting to head his side into the lead.

It won over the Argentinian captain, which was an important step toward keeping your place in the national team. Maradona's book *Touched by God* positively gushes about Cuchu. He was integral to the tournament with his captain's name stamped all over it.

In the following round, he was tasked with marking Enzo Francescoli. The Uruguayan was in a rich vein of form, being named South American Footballer of the Year in 1984, and then the first foreign player to win Argentine Player of the Year in 1985, with his 25 goals in 32 games securing the title for Los Millonarios. Not that any of that impressed Cuchu, who kept him quiet for 90 minutes to help his side progress.

He played in the game against England that was, once again, dominated by Maradona, but it was in the semi-final that he earned his captain's praise again. For the second, brilliant goal, Cuchu intercepted a stray pass from Belgium, and played it into Maradona in the centre. While the maestro strutted his stuff through the defence, the defender's run is often overlooked, but expecting the ball to be played back to him he continued. It opened up the defence just enough for Maradona to dance between the defenders and put a tight, difficult game beyond doubt. One person it wasn't overlooked by was Maradona himself, who acknowledged the defender's contribution.

Cuchu had a quiet, dependable final, but played the full 90 minutes as Argentina won the trophy for the second time in three tournaments. Cuchu hadn't expected to play, but had been a key part of the side. He moved to one of Argentina's great clubs after the tournament, transferring to Boca Juniors. His move coincided with the barren spell for the blue and gold, and domestic silverware once again eluded the defender. He moved to France in 1990, spending three years at Nimes and helping them into Ligue 1, before returning to Cordoba and finishing his career at Belgrano. He hung up his boots after one season.

When he died, there was an outpouring of emotion, and the great and the good flocked to his funeral. Maradona was full of praise for him, and in his book likened his defensive ability to Franz Beckenbauer and his passing ability to Zico. To even be mentioned in the same breath as them, and by him, is testament to his greatness.

# FA Vase 2024-25

## 1st Round Preview

177 clubs have progressed from the Qualifying Rounds to join the 29 clubs exempted until this 1st Round of the FA Vase.

8 of the debut clubs remain in the competition: Wombwell Town, FC Hartlepool, Sutton United (Birmingham), Foley Meir, Allscott Heath, Rayleigh Town, Windsor and Eton and Sturminster Newton United who host Okehampton Argyle in a tie that guarantees a Step Six club will be in the next round, and the winner will set a best run in the Vase.

10 ties in total guarantee Step Six clubs will be in next round with half of them resulting in the winner either setting or equalling their best Vase run.

15 ties overall will see club's celebrating best Vase runs with six of them guaranteeing club's in the 2nd Round for first time ever including the winner of Benfleet FC Vs Newbury Forest who met in the competition just two years ago.

14 ties in this round have happened before in the competition including Tunbridge Wells versus Pagham FC, the only tie to have happened more than once before, both won by Tunbridge Wells.

4 ties actually happened just last season whilst Thetford United has had the longest wait of 21 years to avenge a heavy 5-0 defeat by Cornard United in the competition.

4 former winners are participating in this round with only Newport Pagnell Town facing opponents that have ever played in the 'Proper' Rounds before, Milton Keynes Irish.

94 clubs are still standing that began this season's campaign in the 1st Qualifying Round including Northallerton Town who are in the 1st Round despite not officially playing a game to get here with their 1st Qualifying Round opponents disqualified and their 2nd Qualifying Round opponents withdrawing. They allegedly host Champion AFC in this round.

15 goals have already been scored by Chadderton FC as the top scorers in the Vase so far this season. In their successive Cup games this season Chadderton FC were involved in an eight goal FA Cup tie, a 10 goal 1st Qualifying Round game and a 12 goal 2nd Qualifying Round match. What chance 14 goals in their 1st Round tie against Bury FC?

12 goals were also scored in Clay Cross Town's 2nd Qualifying Round tie against Aylestone Park, as they were involved in the first ever 6-6 draw in FA Vase history!
