Our History

Founded | 1895 Nickname | 'The Krooners' Home Colours | Red & White Away Colours | Blue & White Ground | Krooner Park Capacity | 1,976 2023 - 2024| 15th Combined Counties Premier South



The club was established in 1895 after a discussion at St Michael's church, and was originally named St Michael's Foot-ball Club, although they became known as St Michael's, Camberley. The first match, a friendly, was played on 16 October against D Company from the Royal Military College in nearby Sandhurst, St Michael's won 4–2. In January 1896 they joined the Surrey County Football Association, entering and winning the Surrey Junior Cup in 1897–98; the club's first competitive game was played on 16 October 1897, a Junior Cup first round match against Farncombe which St Michael's won 5–2. After winning the cup, the club joined the East & West Surrey League for the 1898–99 season.

In January 1901 a public meeting was held, at which it was decided to establish a new club that would absorb both St Michael's and Camberley Magpies. The name Camberley & Yorktown was adopted and the club took St Michael's place in the East & West Surrey League. However, they dropped into the Aldershot Combination in 1902, before switching to the Ascot & District League in 1903. The club finished as runners-up in their first season and went on to win the league in 1904–05. They were runners-up again in 1905–06, before winning a hat-trick of successive titles in 1907–08, 1908–09 and 1909–10, remaining unbeaten throughout the third of the title-winning seasons. The season also saw them win the Surrey Junior Cup for a second time, beating Sutton United 2–0 in the final. In 1910 Camberley & Yorktown returned to the East & West Surrey League, which had been renamed the West

Surrey League. In 1912–13 the club also entered the three-club Aldershot Senior Civilian League, which they won. They went on to win the West Surrey League the following season.

In 1922 Camberley & Yorktown were founder members of the Surrey Senior League. They won three successive titles in 1930 –31, 1931–32 and 1932–33 and were runners-up in 1938–39. After World War II the club was renamed Camberley, and were Surrey Senior League runners-up in 1946–47, before winning the league's Charity Cup in 1951–52 with a 4–3 win over Chertsey Town. The club were league runners-up again in 1961–62, and adopted their current name on 2 June 1967 after merging with former Parthenon League club

Camberley Wanderers. In 1973 they joined the Spartan League, but left to join Division Two of the Athenian League in 1975. In 1977 they switched to Division Two of the Isthmian League, and were promoted to Division One after finishing as Division Two runners-up in 1978–79. Two seasons later they were relegated, and after a single season back in Division Two, they rejoined the Athenian League, which now had a single division.

In 1983 Rick Wakeman became the club's chairman while he was living in Camberley. He remained in this post until 1986 when he was elected Vice-President, and left the club when he moved to the Isle of Man in 1988. In 1984 the Athenian League disbanded; Camberley rejoined the Isthmian League and were placed in Division Two South, where they remained until being placed in Division Three following league reorganisation in 1991. In 1998–99 the club reached the first round of the FA Cup for the first time. Drawn against away to Third Division Brentford, they lost 5–0. Division Three became Division Two in 2002, and Camberley remained members until the end of the 2005–06 season, when they dropped into the Premier Division of the Combined Counties League through the FA's re-structuring of non-league football. They were runners-up in the division in 2013–14 and 2014–15.

They came third in the 2015-16 season in the North division of the Combined counties league 2016-17 saw a sixth place finish and seventh the season after. 2018-19 saw a sixteenth place finish and with the 2019-20 season not finishing and the 2020-21 one not even starting due to covid, they started the 2021-22 season in the Combined Counties Premier Division South and Manager Luke Turkington oversaw a twelfth place finish on 44 points. 2022-23 Season was an improvement on the previous finishing tenth with 52 Points, with a fantastic run of 1 defeat in the last 14 league games of the season, that was at a time when games were coming thick and fast as the season had to be extended by 2 weeks to make up for the bad weather earlier in the campaign. 2023-24 was a disappointing season which was entered into with the hope to push on from the prior years and maybe see if we could get in the top 5 for the newly instigated playoffs.

GROUND

In 1898 the club started playing at the new Recreation Ground on London Road, although they also used a pitch near Southwell Park Road when the Recreation Ground was unavailable and had moved there permanently by 1905. They played there until moving to Martin's Meadow in 1909. However, when the tenancy came to an end, the club returned to the Recreation Ground.

Since 1923 the club have played at Krooner Park on Wilton Road. The ground was paid for with the winnings of a horse named Krooner who won two races at Haydock Park Racecourse in 1920.

It was officially opened on 22 December 1923. Due to financial difficulties Krooner Park was sold back to the local council in 1939 with the council guaranteeing that the ground would be retained in perpetuity and that it would be rented to the football club, giving them priority whilst they remained in existence. In the mid-1960s the club asked thee council to leave Krooner Park and build a new ground at South- cote Park Farm, but the request was rejected due to the amount of engineering that would be required. Floodlights were installed at the ground in 1974, with the first floodlit match being a friendly against Crystal Palace on 14 October. The attendance at the match, which ended in a 1–1 draw, was around 3,100, a ground record. The highest confirmed attendance at Krooner Park was 2,066 when the newly-formed Aldershot Town visited for an Isthmian League Division Three match on 10 November 1992.

Abbey Rangers

Formed : 1976 Home Ground : Addelstome Moor Last Season : 8th Combined counties Premier South



Abbey Rangers were established in 1976, initially as a youth club for boys aged 7–16, and taking its name from the historic Chertsey Abbey.

The initial years the club had a rather nomadic existence having to use various home grounds within Chertsey and Addlestone but, as the club grew in size, it became clear that the club needed to plant it's roots and were able to do so when we established a home on the old Meads school playing fields now known as Addlestone Moor. That ground now accommodates all formats of football from $5 \vee 5$ up to adults.

After years of effort, the club opened up its new clubhouse in 2008, a superb and very welcoming facility partly funded by the Football Foundation. The facility was officially opened by Sir Trevor Brooking on 3rd June 2008.

The club has attained the FA Charter Community Status, and now have a healthy and growing girls and ladies section. The club also prides itself on being one of the leading lights in Surrey at providing disability football.

The club became members of the Surrey & Hants Border League under the management of Les Chatfield and Bob Thorpe. winning Division One in 2004–05. After winning the league , League Cup and County Cup in 2007-08 the decision was taken to move to Saturdays and entered the Guildford and Woking Alliance League winning Division 2 in the 1 st season. The following season saw the club pick up another treble including another County Cup

The following season (2010-11) we joined the Surrey County Intermediate League (Western) and finished runners up in Division One. That meant promotion to the Premier Division and finished runners up which meant promotion to the Surrey Elite Intermediate League. We were also County Cup runners up.

We remained in the league until 2014–15 winning the Intermediate League cup in 2014 and another County Cup final appearance in 2015 losing out to Horsley.

In 2015 the club invested in the ground with a view to entering the Combined Counties League and, after finishing 4th in the Surrey Elite League we were accepted for the 2015-16 season which also allowed us to enter the FA Vase. Our 1st season in the Vase saw us clock some miles up but we reached the 2nd round proper before losing to Newport (IOW) in extra time. After a slow start to the league programme we finished the season on an unbeaten 18 game run that saw us grab 3rd place and with it, promotion to the Premier Division at the 1st attempt.

In 2016-17 there were new faces at the helm as Les Chatfield & Bob Thorpes impressive reign came to an end and they handed the stewardship over to Mike Woolgar & Paul Johnson. This season saw the clubs 1st Foray in the FA Cup but lost out to a good Thame United side.

Another run in the FA Vase saw us go a round further than the previous season losing out to Eastbourne Town. The final league table saw us achieve a top 10 finish although, but for a stuttering end of season, we could easily have finished higher.

The following season was a much tougher season which saw us looking over our shoulders at the relegation places but we managed to amass enough points to keep our place in the Premier Division.

Season 2018-19 saw the club reach new levels by reaching the last 16 in the FA Vase before losing out to Cray Valley (PM) as well as the Semi finals of the CCL Premier Cup and the quarter finals of Southern Combination Challenge cup both 1sts for the club. We also achieved our highest league position finishing in 3rd place.

2019-20 season saw us embark on an FA Cup run that saw us reach the 3 rd Qualifying round defeating 2 step 4 clubs on the way in East Grinstead and Whitehawk before bowing out to Whyteleafe in the 3rd qualifying round. That season was curtailed due to covid with us challenging the promotion spots in the CCL.

2021-22 also saw us challenging for the promotions spots again before eventually missing out to Southall.

2022-23 also saw us challenging again spending a considerable time on top of the league but eventually finished 4th .

2023-24 saw us spend the best part of the season in the play off spots but a couple of slip ups towards the end of the season saw us drop out, In the summer of 2024-25 Adam Bessent took over the management role assisted by his brother.

Off the field the club continues to progress and in the summer of 2018 we were proud to open our 3G facility which can only help the club to grow and help to develop players through our youth sections in both boys and girls football.

Friday, I'm in Love

In March 1976, Reading played host to Tranmere Rovers. A promotion clash, with the home side chasing their first success in half a century. A long ball is fired up toward Robin Friday. With his back to goal, he controls it on his chest, letting it drop. With one deft touch, he flicks it over his shoulder, and spinning, fires it 25 yards into the top corner. A moment of genius. His celebration - running behind the goal to kiss a policeman on the head - typical.

Friday grew up in West London, and had trials with a number of clubs before settling into non-league football. The forward, with his flowing locks, mercurial talent, and serious appeal with the ladies, definitely fit the mould of the maverick talents of his day. As a teenager he showed his talents on the school team. Unfortunately, he also showed the less savoury side of his nature, committing petty crimes and drinking. He picked up jobs while playing for Walthamstow Avenue and then Hayes, setting the Isthmian league alight. When Hayes were drawn against Reading in the cup, he impressed them, and the Fourth Division side gave him a contract.

He was given a debut against Northampton, promising to stay home, not drink and not fight. 'I don't mind you lying to me, but not three times' came the sardonic reply from Charlie Hurley. He knew how to treat his star.

The exchange is typical of Friday. He was constantly late for training - if he turned up at all - and won games single-handedly. Hurley was relaxed as long as he performed, and the fans fell in love with him; he frequented the same pubs and nightclubs as they did.

At the end of his first season, Friday disappeared. He didn't show for pre-season training. He didn't show for the first friendlies. When he did finally appear, he was dishevelled and with his boots in a carrier bag. He had been at a hippy commune in Cornwall. He had tattoos all over his fingers, and the surgery to get them removed put him out of action for a month.

Not that it mattered to Reading, for whom he scored 20 goals that season and established himself as a hero. Sheffield United and Arsenal came calling, Bertie Mee watching Friday himself, before deciding his lack of discipline was too much of a hindrance. What Mee didn't know was how Friday spent the long journey's on the team coach, where alcohol was the least problematic substance he consumed.

The 1975/76 season started with 13 home wins, while Aston Villa, West Brom and Liverpool came to see him play, among others. Cardiff made a bid of £60,000 that was turned down. In March, against Tranmere, Friday showed why. By the end of the season, Reading had ended a 50 year drought, and secured promotion.

A dispute over the promotion bonus (a bag of beef), however, saw disharmony in the squad. A reticence to honour promotion contract rises only exacerbated the issue. His drug habit intensified and his form dropped, but Cardiff saw a bargain. For £30,000 they took him to Wales. He was arrested on the train for not buying a ticket, and his new manager had to collect him from the police station.


His debut was against the Fulham of Bobby Moore, a game that typified the best and the worst of Robin Friday. He scored twice, and grabbed the former England captain's genitals. Manager Jimmy Andrews fell in love with him, but it was a short-lived affair. Seven goals in the second half of the season cemented his place in Cardiff fans' hearts, but one in particular stood out. Rounding Luton's Milija Aleksic and finding the net, he celebrated by sticking two fingers up to the goalkeeper. The resulting image was used on an album cover by the Super Furry Animals, and he was publicly criticised by his manager.


The following season, though, was the end. He missed the first two months of the season after contracting dysentery, and on his return against Brighton kicked a young Mark Lawrenson in the face. He got a straight red card, and then allegedly left a somewhat dirty protest in the future Liverpool man's kit bag.

Andrews was incensed, and let the player know. For Friday, that was enough. He disappeared from training, and then announced his retirement at just 25. Three and a half years of a professional career, and he was done.

In some ways, the career of Robin Friday is a tragedy of wasted talent. But he never thought so. He was having fun, until he wasn't, then he stopped. When he died of a heart attack at 38, with his drink and drug-fuelled debauchery, people weren't shocked, they were just sad. But in three years, he provided more memories than most players do in a whole career. That's no waste of talent. That was just Robin Friday.

Signposted from A3, follow signs to Leisure Centre. When entering the Leisure Centre the football ground is at the end of the drive, with a large amount of free parking.
