Our History

Founded | 1895 Nickname | 'The Krooners' Home Colours | Red & White Away Colours | Blue & White Ground | Krooner Park Capacity | 1,976 2023 - 2024 | 15th Combined Counties Premier South



The club was established in 1895 after a discussion at St Michael's church, and was originally named St Michael's Foot-ball Club, although they became known as St Michael's, Camberley. The first match, a friendly, was played on 16 October against D Company from the Royal Military College in nearby Sandhurst, St Michael's won 4–2. In January 1896 they joined the Surrey County Football Association, entering and winning the Surrey Junior Cup in 1897–98; the club's first competitive game was played on 16 October 1897, a Junior Cup first round match against Farncombe which St Michael's won 5–2. After winning the cup, the club joined the East & West Surrey League for the 1898–99 season.

In January 1901 a public meeting was held, at which it was decided to establish a new club that would absorb both St Michael's and Camberley Magpies. The name Camberley & Yorktown was adopted and the club took St Michael's place in the East & West Surrey League. However, they dropped into the Aldershot Combination in 1902, before switching to the Ascot & District League in 1903. The club finished as runners-up in their first season and went on to win the league in 1904–05. They were runners-up again in 1905–06, before winning a hat-trick of successive titles in 1907–08, 1908–09 and 1909–10, remaining unbeaten throughout the third of the title-winning seasons. The season also saw them win the Surrey Junior Cup for a second time, beating Sutton United 2–0 in the final. In 1910 Camberley & Yorktown returned to the East & West Surrey League, which had been renamed the West

Surrey League. In 1912–13 the club also entered the three-club Aldershot Senior Civilian League, which they won. They went on to win the West Surrey League the following season. In 1922 Camberley & Yorktown were founder members of the Surrey Senior League. They won three successive titles in 1930 –31, 1931–32 and 1932–33 and were runners-up in 1938–39. After World War II the club was renamed Camberley, and were Surrey Senior League runners-up in 1946–47,

before winning the league's Charity Cup in 1951–52 with a 4–3 win over Chertsey Town. The club were league runners-up again in 1961–62, and adopted their current name on 2 June 1967 after merging with former Parthenon League club

Camberley Wanderers. In 1973 they joined the Spartan League, but left to join Division Two of the Athenian League in 1975. In 1977 they switched to Division Two of the Isthmian League, and were promoted to Division One after finishing as Division Two runners-up in 1978–79. Two seasons later they were relegated, and after a single season back in Division Two, they rejoined the Athenian League, which now had a single division.

In 1983 Rick Wakeman became the club's chairman while he was living in Camberley. He remained in this post until 1986 when he was elected Vice-President, and left the club when he moved to the Isle of Man in 1988. In 1984 the Athenian League disbanded; Camberley rejoined the Isthmian League and were placed in Division Two South, where they remained until being placed in Division Three following league reorganisation in 1991. In 1998–99 the club reached the first round of the FA Cup for the first time. Drawn against away to Third Division Brentford, they lost 5–0. Division Three became Division Two in 2002, and Camberley remained members until the end of the 2005–06 season, when they dropped into the Premier Division of the Combined Counties League through the FA's re-structuring of non-league football. They were runners-up in the division in 2013–14 and 2014–15.

They came third in the 2015-16 season in the North division of the Combined counties league 2016-17 saw a sixth place finish and seventh the season after. 2018-19 saw a sixteenth place finish and with the 2019-20 season not finishing and the 2020-21 one not even starting due to covid, they started the 2021-22 season in the Combined Counties Premier Division South and Manager Luke Turkington oversaw a twelfth place finish on 44 points. 2022-23 Season was an improvement on the previous finishing tenth with 52 Points, with a fantastic run of 1 defeat in the last 14 league games of the season, that was at a time when games were coming thick and fast as the season had to be extended by 2 weeks to make up for the bad weather earlier in the campaign. 2023-24 was a disappointing season which was entered into with the hope to push on from the prior years and maybe see if we could get in the top 5 for the newly instigated playoffs.

GROUND

In 1898 the club started playing at the new Recreation Ground on London Road, although they also used a pitch near Southwell Park Road when the Recreation Ground was unavailable and had moved there permanently by 1905. They played there until moving to Martin's Meadow in 1909. However, when the tenancy came to an end, the club returned to the Recreation Ground.

Since 1923 the club have played at Krooner Park on Wilton Road. The ground was paid for with the winnings of a horse named Krooner who won two races at Haydock Park Racecourse in 1920.

It was officially opened on 22 December 1923. Due to financial difficulties Krooner Park was sold back to the local council in 1939 with the council guaranteeing that the ground would be retained in perpetuity and that it would be rented to the football club, giving them priority whilst they remained in existence. In the mid-1960s the club asked thee council to leave Krooner Park and build a new ground at South- cote Park Farm, but the request was rejected due to the amount of engineering that would be required. Floodlights were installed at the ground in 1974, with the first floodlit match being a friendly against Crystal Palace on 14 October. The attendance at the match, which ended in a 1–1 draw, was around 3,100, a ground record. The highest confirmed attendance at Krooner Park was 2,066 when the newly-formed Aldershot Town visited for an Isthmian League Division Three match on 10 November 1992.

Spelthorne Sports Club has been providing sports for the local community since 1922. We pride ourselves in providing football to all, within the right environment, to persons of all ages and abilities, so they can enjoy and learn playing football. All our coaches and managers provide this voluntarily. In 2013–14, the Spelly won the Middlesex FA Intermediate Cup, beating Middlesex County Premier side Cricklewood Wanderers 3–0 in the Final. On 16 April 2014, Spelthorne Sports were crowned Combined Counties Division One Champions with a 2–1 win away to Epsom Athletic. They lifted the trophy 3 days later following an emphatic 7–0 win at home to local rivals Staines Lammas. The Spelly also won the RPM Records Division One Challenge Cup against Staines Lammas at Windsor FC on 5 May 2014. A single second half Lee Staples goal was enough to make sure The Spelly lifted the trophy, winning the league and cup treble in the process. The team went on a phenomenal 46 game unbeaten run in all competitions that season, beating teams in cup competitions from higher divisions such as Frimley Green, Staines Town (on pens), Walton Casuals, Wembley, and Epsom & Ewell (on pens).

That unbeaten run finally came to an end on 7 May 2014 when they played Combined Counties Premier Division side Hanworth Villa in the Southern Combination Cup Final, losing 1–0. The game was played at home and marked the club's first ever game under the newly installed floodlights. The lads then suffered their second defeat of the season to the same opposition when the sides met again 3 days later in the Cherry Red Records Premier Challenge Cup Final, again losing 1–0.

The 2013–14 season was extremely successful for Spelthorne Sports. Winning two cup finals, and finishing runners-up in another two cup finals. However the biggest achievement by far was winning the league without losing a single game in the process. Winning 22, drawing 8, losing 0, scoring 92, and conceding 23.

Season 2014-2015 saw us in action in the Combined Counties Premier Division where we finished in a very respectful 6th position. Our first experience of the FA Vase occurred in September of this season with a win against Langford followed by another win against Risborough Rangers. Season 2015/16 saw our first appearance in the FA CUP with a 2-1 home win against Stotfold. We then travelled to Cogenhoe only to lose 3-0. The season continued with a change of management back under the control of Steve Flatman with support from Paul Burgess and Mark Harper.

Season 2016/17 saw us off to a great start in the FA Cup beating CCL Winners Hartley Wintney 4-3, only to fall at the next hurdle losing 2-3 at home to Andover Town. Season 2017/18 ended in us reaching our first Senior Cup Final against local rivals Hanworth Villa, only to narrowly lose 3-2 on the day. Season 2018/19 saw our best ever FA Cup runs and our highest Premier Division finish (6th place), having finished 8th, 9th, and 10th in our first 3.

Season 2019/20 will be remembered as the one that wasn't! However, we shall remember it as being 2nd in the table with Mark Harper, Daren Bulman & Andy Viney at the helm. Following this, we again had to deal with the COVID pandemic, and another cut short season.

That season saw a re-shuffle of step 5 leagues with Combined Counties now having North & South Premier Divisions. We are in the North Div and welcomed some new opponents to THE SPELLY! We also welcomed Jason Tucker to the coaching team.

At the end of the 2022/23 season, Manager Mark Harper accepted the offer to take over the vacant Manager position at Chertsey Town with Andrew Viney joining him. All of our support staff moved onto pastures new and so a new era has begun for Spelly in 2023/24. Myles Hook has taken over as First Team Manager, Dan Green as Assistant Manager and we welcomed Darren Bullen as First Team Coach. 2023-24 yet again a reshuffle of the league with Spelly transferring across Step 5 from the Combined Counties North Premier Division to the South Premier Division, With a month remaining of the season, an 8 point deduction had been applied to the Spelly by the league for an administrative oversight. This threatened our Step 5 status but it didn't deter the Spelly, finishing 17th and outside the relegation positions. Farnham Town crowned champions and unbeaten in the league, whilst AFC Croydon part-owned by Stormzy achieved promotion via the play-offs.

Mr. Goal 250 Apps & 221 Goals

Tanju Colak was arguably, for a period in the late 1980s and early 1990s, the most fearsome striker in Europe. The Turkish frontman was a star for Galatasaray and then, controversially, Fenerbahce, proving unstoppable in his home country and deadly on the European stage. But instead of cementing his status as a legend, Tanju had dark secrets, often insisting on bringing a gun to training for his own protection from the mafia. When he should have been enjoying a glorious swansong and moving into retirement, he was caught engaging with the criminals he was so aware of, and consequently sent to prison. It was a dark ending against the brightest of careers.

Tanju was born in Samsun, joining his local Super Lig side at the age of 19 and making an instant impact, even as the team struggled. In his first season, he scored 16 goals, but saw his team suffer relegation. The failed at the first attempts, despite his goals, but secured promotion the following season.

Samsunspor were the following season's surprise team, upsetting the natural order and the bookmakers to compete for the league title. Tanju finished as the league's top scorer as his side finished third, and then added another 25 goals in 1986/87 for good measure. The giants of Turkish football had seen enough, and didn't enjoy the league's best forward playing for some upstarts from the east. At the end of that season, Tanju moved to Galatasaray.

He scored a spectacular bicycle kick in his second game - one of two strikes - on his way to a record 39 goals in his first season. Nicknamed 'The King', his record remains unbeaten. More than a goal per game, once again, saw him win the European Golden Shoe, and Tanju and Galatasaray won the league with a comfortable 12-point margin. Unbeknownst to anyone, that would be his only major honour.

The following two seasons were disappointing domestically, although Tanju continued to score at a rapid rate. And in 1989, Gala went further than any Turkish team before or since in the European Cup, reaching the semi-finals where they were defeated by Steaua Bucharest, who were surprising everyone. Tanju once again played his part, scoring freely against European competition. At home, the following season, he once more scored more goals that games, driving Gala back up to second, but falling short of Gordon Milne's great Besiktas side.

At the end of that season, in a bid to cut costs, Galatasaray sought to reduce the wages of some of their highest earners, Tanju among them. He was settled in Istanbul, and had been made captain of a side where he was loved, but the forward was unwilling to have his wages cut to the levels of what he deemed to be inferior players.

He pleaded with the board to reconsider, and with his manager to exert some influence, but there was nothing they could do. A big offer was made by Marseille, which Tanju considered, but not wanting to leave Turkey, he took another, far more controversial decision. Fenerbahce, Galatasaray's great rivals, had heard of the contract dispute, and took the opportunity to pounce. Tanju moved from the European to the Asian side of the city, maintaining his wages, but threatening his legendary status.

At Fener, Tanju continued to score goals, and continued to just miss out on titles. But his private life was starting to become a cause for concern. Rumours surfaced in the press that the forward, who was married, was having an affair with Turkish actress Hulya Avsar, with details of his treachery splashed across the newspapers. That scandal did little to stop his goalscoring form, but the next one certainly did.

In December 1992, Tanju was arrested on suspicion of knowingly receiving a stolen Mercedes, and selling it on. Fenerbahce went to bat for their star man, with Club President Aziz Yildirim even going as far as calling the authorities corrupt. It made no difference, and Tanju was found guilty, sentenced to nine years in prison. He fled to Macedonia, but was quickly rearrested, and incarcerated.

The sentence was reduced on appeal, and then reduced again for his cooperation and good behaviour, but it was the end of his playing career. He was the Super Lig's highest ever goalscorer, a record that stood until Hakan Sukur went ahead of him, and fourth on Galatasaray's scoring list, despite only spending four seasons at the club.

His status at that club was trashed by his move across the city more than his arrest, but how was he seen at Fenerbahce? After his release, and retirement, the club arranged a testimonial for him, in which he made his final appearance on a football pitch. He donated the proceeds to a disaster relief fund, and returned to Samsun for a life of failed politics and repeated problems with the law.

A great goalscoring career, ended by criminality. But, for Fenerbahce at least, Tanju Colak remains a legend.
