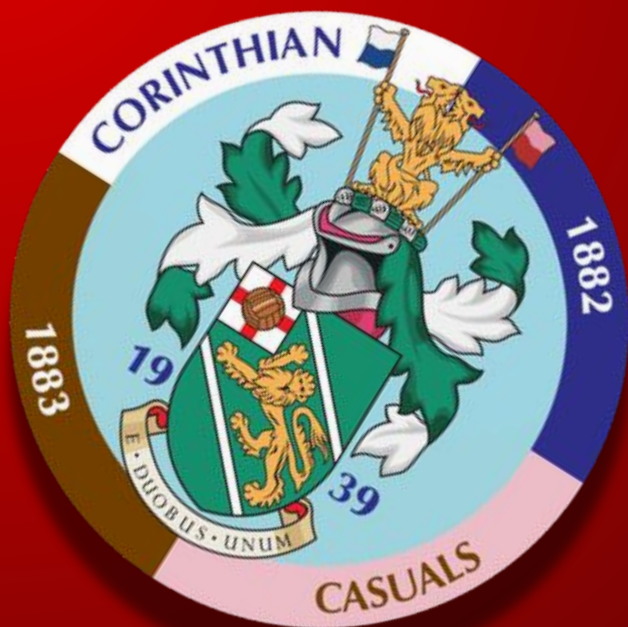

Our History



Founded | 1895

The club was established in 1895 after a discussion at St Michael's church, and was originally named St Michael's Foot-ball Club, although they became known as St Michael's, Camberley.

The first match, a friendly, was played on 16 October against D Company from the Royal Military College in nearby Sandhurst, St Michael's won 4–2. In January 1896 they joined the Surrey County Football Association, entering and winning the Surrey Junior Cup in 1897–98; the club's first competitive game was played on 16 October 1897, a Junior Cup first round match against Farncombe which St Michael's won 5–2. After winning the cup, the club joined the East & West Surrey League for the 1898–99 season.

In January 1901 a public meeting was held, at which it was decided to establish a new club that would absorb both St Michael's and Camberley Magpies. The name Camberley & Yorktown was adopted and the club took St Michael's place in the East & West Surrey League. However, they dropped into the Aldershot Combination in 1902, before switching to the Ascot & District League in 1903. The club finished as runners-up in their first season and went on to win the league in 1904–05. They were runners-up again in 1905–06, before winning a hat-trick of successive titles in 1907–08, 1908–09 and 1909–10, remaining unbeaten throughout the third of the title-winning seasons. The season also saw them win the Surrey Junior Cup for a second time, beating Sutton United 2–0 in the final. In 1910 Camberley & Yorktown returned to the East & West Surrey League, which had been renamed the West

Surrey League. In 1912–13 the club also entered the three-club Aldershot Senior Civilian League, which they won. They went on to win the West Surrey League the following season.

In 1922 Camberley & Yorktown were founder members of the Surrey Senior League. They won three successive titles in 1930–31, 1931–32 and 1932–33 and were runners-up in 1938–39. After World War II the club was renamed Camberley, and were Surrey Senior League runners-up in 1946–47, before winning the league's Charity Cup in 1951–52 with a 4–3 win over Chertsey Town. The club were league runners-up again in 1961–62, and adopted their current name on 2 June 1967 after merging with former Parthenon League club

Camberley Wanderers. In 1973 they joined the Spartan League, but left to join Division Two of the Athenian League in 1975. In 1977 they switched to Division Two of the Isthmian League, and were promoted to Division One after finishing as Division Two runners-up in 1978–79. Two seasons later they were relegated, and after a single season back in Division Two, they rejoined the Athenian League, which now had a single division.

In 1983 Rick Wakeman became the club's chairman while he was living in Camberley. He remained in this post until 1986 when he was elected Vice-President, and left the club when he moved to the Isle of Man in 1988. In 1984 the Athenian League disbanded; Camberley rejoined the Isthmian League and were placed in Division Two South, where they remained until being placed in Division Three following league reorganisation in 1991. In 1998–99 the club reached the first round of the FA Cup for the first time. Drawn against away to Third Division Brentford, they lost 5–0. Division Three became Division Two in 2002, and Camberley remained members until the end of the 2005–06 season, when they dropped into the Premier Division of the Combined Counties League through the FA's re-structuring of non-league football. They were runners-up in the division in 2013–14 and 2014–15.

They came third in the 2015-16 season in the North division of the Combined counties league 2016-17 saw a sixth place finish and seventh the season after. 2018-19 saw a sixteenth place finish and with the 2019-20 season not finishing and the 2020-21 one not even starting due to covid, they started the 2021-22 season in the Combined Counties Premier Division South and Manager Luke Turkington oversaw a twelfth place finish on 44 points. 2022-23 Season was an improvement on the previous finishing tenth with 52 Points, with a fantastic run of 1 defeat in the last 14 league games of the season, that was at a time when games were coming thick and fast as the season had to be extended by 2 weeks to make up for the bad weather earlier in the campaign. 2023-24 was a disappointing season which was entered into with the hope to push on from the prior years and maybe see if we could get in the top 5 for the newly instigated playoffs.

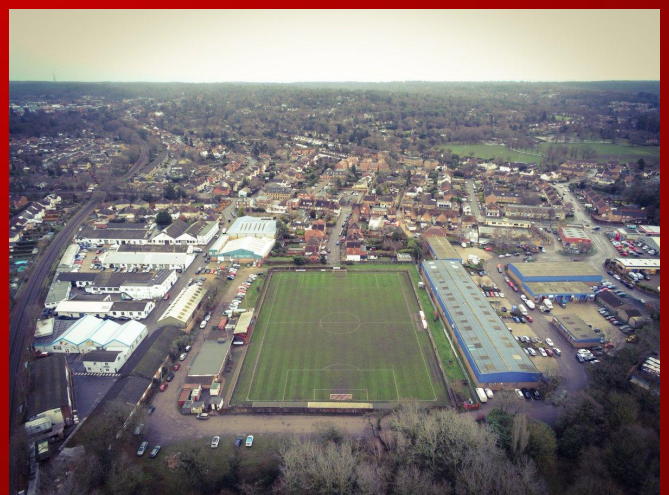
GROUND

In 1898 the club started playing at the new Recreation Ground on London Road, although they also used a pitch near Southwell Park Road when the Recreation Ground was unavailable and had moved there permanently by 1905. They played there until moving to Martin's Meadow in 1909. However, when the tenancy came to an end, the club returned to the Recreation Ground.

Since 1923 the club have played at Krooner Park on Wilton Road. The ground was paid for with the winnings of a horse named Krooner who won two races at Haydock Park Racecourse in 1920.

It was officially opened on 22 December 1923. Due to financial difficulties Krooner Park was sold back to the local council in 1939 with the council guaranteeing that the ground would be retained in perpetuity and that it would be rented to the football club, giving them priority whilst they remained in existence. In the mid-1960s the club asked the council to leave Krooner Park and build a new ground at South-cote Park Farm, but the request was rejected due to the amount of engineering that would be required.

Floodlights were installed at the ground in 1974, with the first floodlit match being a friendly against Crystal Palace on 14 October. The attendance at the match, which ended in a 1–1 draw, was around 3,100, a ground record. The highest confirmed attendance at Krooner Park was 2,066 when the newly-formed Aldershot Town visited for an Isthmian League Division Three match on 10 November 1992.

Corinthian -Casuals A (very short) History



Hidden away off a slip road by the A3 in Tolworth is King George's Arena, home to one of the most significant clubs in the history of world football: Corinthian-Casuals.

The club in its modern guise was formed in 1939 as the result of a merger between two grand old amateur clubs, Corinthian FC and Casuals FC, that helped to popularise football around the world. Corinthian FC was founded in 1882, when the FA suits were tired of seeing Scotland get the better of their team and set about starting a club that could act as a launching pad for the England national team. The plan worked: it wasn't long before England were trouncing Scotland on a regular basis, and 'The Corinthians' – as they were known – provided the entire England XI for two international matches, in 1894 and 1895.

Corinthianism has always stood for sporting integrity, fair play and the power of the game for the greater good. In 1884, the first-ever black international footballer – Scotland full-back Andrew Watson – chose to represent the Corinthians when he moved to England and influenced their famous sweeping attacking passing style significantly.

There were characters everywhere in those days. The team's captain during the late Victorian period was Charles Wreford-Brown, a charismatic centre-half who is often credited with coining the term "soccer" when he used it as an abbreviation of "association football".

In 1939, the Corinthians merged with Casuals FC to form Corinthian-Casuals, wearing the pink-and-chocolate shirts of the Casuals, who had their own proud history. Formed in 1883, they were a strong force in the early amateur game, runners up in the first FA Amateur Cup Final in 1894, founder members of the Isthmian League in 1905, first holders of the AFA Senior Cup in 1907 and winners of the FA Amateur Cup in 1936.

The newly merged Corinthian-Casuals entered the league system and reached the FA Amateur Cup final in 1956, with England cricket star Micky Stewart among their number, but after drawing at Wembley were defeated by Bishop Auckland in a replay at Middlesbrough.

The club has twice reached the FA Cup first round proper since amalgamation too, playing Watford in 1965/66 and Bristol City in 1982/83. 1988 was a truly historic year, as the club returned to Brazil, where they faced a Corinthians All-Star XI featuring Brazilian greats Rivellino and Socrates.

Indeed, Socrates played for both sides, pulling on the pink-and-brown of the Casuals midway through the second half, in a moment that has gone down in club folklore.

The new millennium brought plenty more historic adventures for the Corinthian-Casuals. They visited Brazil again in 2001 and then were invited to play a friendly at the recently reopened Wembley Stadium in 2008, when AFC Wimbledon were their opponents. Then, in 2015, they finally played the SC Corinthians Paulista first team for the first time in the two clubs' history. 30,000 people turned up for the momentous occasion in the Corinthians Arena as the game ended 3-0 to the Brazilian side, but there was great excitement when Jamie Byatt swapped jerseys – and sides – with Corinthians captain Danilo for the last few minutes.

Corinthian-Casuals went from strength to strength in the years that followed under the management of James Bracken, whose brother Danny captained the side as goalkeeper. In 2018, after two near misses, they achieved promotion to the Isthmian Premier Division, and celebrated their first year at Step Three with a post-season trip to Budapest, where they were invited due to the part they played in the growth of football in Hungary. The Bracken brothers departed in the summer of 2022 and the two seasons since have been tough for themen's first team, which has suffered back-to-back relegations. With former manager Brian Adamson now chairman and one-time Casuals midfielder and fans' favourite, Mu Maan, in the dugout, this historic club is once again looking ahead with positivity and ambition.

The Napkin

Josep Maria Minguella is a name not known to many outside the city of his birth. But almost every football fan knows his work. A lawyer, with limited English, he was approached right at the end of the 1960s to provide translation services to then Barcelona manager Vic Buckingham, with the Englishman's side languishing toward the foot of La Liga. An avid fan of the team since childhood visits with his father, he did what we would all do, and accepted. It was the beginning of a journey that culminated in the signing of a contract, on a napkin, at a tennis club, for the greatest player of all time.

After joining the club, despite some communication issues (the translator had lied about his ability, after all), Barcelona slowly lifted themselves away from danger. In his second season, they finished second to a strong Valencia side, only losing out on the title due to their head to head record. Triumph in the Copa del Generalissimo was enough for the board of directors, but not enough for Buckingham, who resigned at the end of the 1970/71 season. He was replaced by Rinus Michels, who would oversee a process that would create the megacub we know today.

Minguella's translation services were not so necessary to the Dutchman, but he was impressed enough at the former lawyer to give him a place on the coaching staff. In four years, he claims he learned everything he needed to know about football. In 1974, Michels won Barca the title for the first time in 14 years, before leaving to take charge of the Netherlands side and then returning to Ajax in 1975 to secure a legacy that has echoed through the history of football. Minguella also left in 1975 for a year at Hercules, but the Alicante climate didn't suit him. He left, and rather than returning to Catalunya, tried his hand at becoming an agent.

Josep Lluís Núñez had won the Barca Presidency in 1978 with a plan to turn the club into an international brand. This included expanding the Camp Nou, and attracting people to fill it with the signing of exciting global superstars. Minguella would be pivotal in that task, despite no longer having an official affiliation with the club. He started by bringing in Carles Rexach to support Núñez in his campaign, and then turned to the task at hand, finding the next big thing. He began his search in Latin America and, not for the last time, found what he was looking for in Argentina.

Diego Maradona was setting the world alight at Argentinos Juniors when Minguella first convinced Nunez to sign him. But Argentina were under the military junta, and not about to let such a prodigious talent leave the country easily. Minguella flew out to ESMA, the regime's concentration camp, to negotiate with Admiral Carlos Lacoste. Whether the regime hid their atrocities from the agent, or whether the agent chose not to notice, is unclear. But he negotiated a loan move for Maradona to Boca, where he could keep a closer eye on him. At the end of that loan spell, with the Falklands War lost and the economy in meltdown, the junta approved the sale of their prized asset to Barcelona, with countless officials taking sizeable cuts of a world record fee.

It kicked off an era of galactico signings. Despite Maradona's short stay in Spain, Minguella oversaw the signings of Guillermo Amor, Miguel Angel Nadal, Romario, and in 1990 went to negotiate with more military figures to secure Hristo Stoichkov's signature from CSKA Sofia. The tempestuous Bulgarian was a risk, but would end up being crucial in Johan Cruyff's legendary side.

In 1999, Minguella began his most famous deal. Alerted to a prodigious talent in Rosario, he once again travelled to Argentina. After Maradona quit in acrimonious circumstances, Barcelona had made some unsuccessful attempts to find his replacement. Short-sighted focus on immediate success meant that they were more concerned with signing more superstars. The result was scepticism when Minguella proposed the signing of a 12 year old. So the lawyer flew that child, and his father, to Barcelona at his own expense. He called Carles Rexach once again, and his old friend arranged a friendly to look at the diminutive player.

The second Rexach laid eyes on Lionel Messi, he knew his club had to sign him. The next day, Minguella invited the Messis to Pompeia Tennis Club to shore up the deal. Over a cold beer, the lawyer drafted the first ever contract for the greatest player in the world.

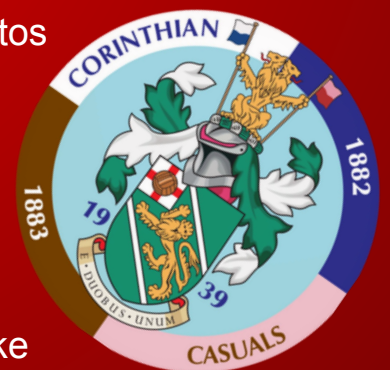
